A Walk in the Park

During any season, the BNAC park is filled with beauty and wonder.

The gardens started their bloom in March and continue through the fall. Thanks to volunteers, Nancy and Connie, the Meditation Garden was given new life this summer as invasive species were removed and the perennial beds returned. The garden in the center of the park was a shade garden until many trees in the area fell and so it is adjusting to the full sunlight it now receives. Gardens closer to the building contain a variety of perennials and wild flowers that are inviting to our pollinator friends. While many see WEEDS in the gardens... butterflies and bees see a WELCOME sign.


Ash trees continue to fall due to the Emerald Ash Borer. Those dead trees have to be cut and hauled out of the park. Just when we think we are making progress, more trees fall. Some can remain on the woodlands floor to become part of the habitat, but we want to make sure there is room for new growth and that the woodlands are not becoming a tinderbox. When you go for a walk, look for the many new growth trees that are now finding their place in the woodlands.

The trails attract many walkers (2 legged and 4 legged). Keeping the trails safe requires a lot of raking and trimming. Making the trails educational is also a priority. An Eagle Scout project placed new QR codes throughout the park so visitors can learn about trees, birds and the history that is part of the park and the

surrounding area. The deer cove picnic area was restored and a new Deer Brochure was added. The BNAC web site now has an EXPLORE section that has over 15 informational guides, maps and family activities.

An Eagle Scout project installed 2 additions to the Little Library. One of these extra storage areas allows children's books to be closer to little eyes and hands. The second addition is being used to hold *Take It and Make It* craft kits on bad weather days. The craft kits continue to be popular, with over 3,000 given away this year. The volunteers will make crafts available through the holiday season.

Many people have stepped up in the past 6 months to enhance and improve the park for visitors and the wildlife who call the park home. Much of the labor needed

The Town of West Seneca invited the commemoration to be held in the West Seneca Community Center. It was a beautiful sharing of history, thanksgiving, and culture. Songs and dances in traditional Seneca garb were highlighted, and a delicious meal was enjoyed by attendees. The Seneca were welcoming and thoughtful hosts.

Drum Circles were held on two Tuesday evenings a month from May through August. They were enjoyed by children, adults and families. Sponsored and led by Kenneth Belote of KP Percussion, it was welcomed like a Rock Concert!

Wonderful Wednesdays, returned to the park on July 13th with bubbles, games, crafts and sidewalk chalk art. The popular and well-attended Wonderful Wednesdays continued every Wednesday through August 10th.





Rain forced the cancellation of Sunday Funday in May and July. June, August and September Sunday Funday events included a variety of scavenger hunts, crafts, games, fairy house creations, story-telling and more. The final Sunday Funday included a dog parade with judging and prizes from Pet Supplies Plus. It was held in the classroom due to rain. Naturalist Mark Carra and his "critters" were on hand, Kiwanis volunteers assisted with games. We also drew the winner in our JUG of JOY raffle which was worth over \$400.
